1. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 4:30 by Vice-Chairman Miller.

2. Roll Call

Nick Miller, Tim Worner, John Krug, Randy Barth all present. Blake Parsons was excused.

3. Approval of Minutes

a. Approval of December 12, 2022, minutes

Motion to approve December minutes made by Barth, seconded by Worner. *Motion passed.*

4. Public Input

Mr. Scott Butzin, 288 Wild Ridge Road, Metamora addressed the committee. He has concerns with regard to HB 547 assault weapon ban. He states that this bill is an infringement on the rights to keep and bear arms. A few years back the Board passed a Resolution supporting the 2nd Amendment. He suggested that it was time to reiterate our concerns. He provided a copy of a Resolution and Ordinances that have been passed by other counties and would like for it to be presented to the Board. He feels a 2nd Amendment Protection Ordinance is more than a statement of principles and gives more authority to the Sheriff to enforce. He asks how the Board can pass an Ordinance that is in conflict with state laws – but if the state law is unconstitutional we have to take a stand.

Motion to approve January claims made by Krug, seconded by Barth. *Motion passed.*

It was explained to the new Board members that if they have any questions about a claim, now is the time to bring them up so the Sheriff can explain them.

It was stated that if something pertinent comes up she can report, but that she has better things to do with her time than type a report.

8. Sheriff

a. ARPA Projects Update Information Only

i. Courthouse / PSB HVAC Project

There are no updates at this time. The equipment has been ordered and should be here in 4-6 weeks. The Courthouse HVAC project will not be started until fall.

ii. Sheriff / EMA Public APP

This project was approved last month. ARPA funds will be used. They have already stated the design and should be up and running in 60 days.

iii. FARO / Drone

The equipment has been ordered and training is getting scheduled. There will be 4 deputies that will be trained as drone pilots.

iv. Axon BWC / Taser / Interview Rm.

We should have the body worn cameras and tasers by the end of the month. The interview room equipment will not arrive till late spring. There are a lot of options that can be add and they are working on finalizing those options.

v. Fire Alarm, IT Network, Telephone, CCTV, parking lot, Retaining Wall, Sidewalks & Ramps.

The above are ARPA projects that will addressed in the near future. The Sheriff is meeting with Heart on the network system, The telephone system has two parts – new handsets and system upgrades. The upgrades can't be done until the handsets are installed. The scope of the CCTV is not totally finished. They will start getting quotes for the parking lot, retaining wall, sidewalks and ramps in the near future.

b. Card Access Project Update

The new system should be activated by the end of the week. The new system was paid for in the previous fiscal year.

c. RLF Elevator Project Update

The scope of work was geared toward ADA compliance. As the project progressed, it changed the fire code we were previously under. We need to add several components to upgrade the fire system. The Fire Marshal should be on site tomorrow (Tuesday) to review what we have done. The elevator upgrades will be completed this week, and the Fire Marshal will let us know if we can operate the elevator without all the fire upgrades being completed. It is estimated that the fire upgrades will be around \$50,000.

d. County IT Staff Discussion

e. Discussion and Action on Sheriff MDC Project Bids

This project will use ARPA funds. We will replace the tablets in the squad cars with more rugged tablets that can handle the physical strains put on them. The received three quotes from Panasonic, Dell, and GETAC. The sheriff suggests going with GETAC. The quote includes a rugged tablet, windows 11, and docking station. We will load the software we need as some of the programs go through 911 or the state databases. Motion to approve the GETAC quote, and not to exceed \$135,000 made by Krug, seconded by Barth. *Motion passed.*

We have received the used vehicle we purchased, and it is getting outfitted right now. We had a car hit a deer with minor damage, but it blew out all the airbags. We will have that vehicle repaired. There was an older Explorer that had some minor damage, and it ended up being totaled. There is a car shortage, but they are handling it the best they can.

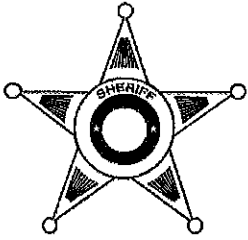

RESOLUTION # 2017/18-#057

**RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE PASSAGE OF
HB1465, HB1467, HB1468, HB1469, AND SB1657
RESTRICTING THE RIGHTS OF US CITIZENS AS
PROTECTED BY THE SECOND AMENDMENT OF THE
UNITED STATES CONSTITUTION**

Resolution opposing the passage of HB1465, HB1467, HB1468, HB1469, SB1657, and any trailer bill, or any bill; similar too, or any bill where the 100th Illinois General Assembly, or any Future General Assemblies, desires to restrict the Individual right of US Citizens as protected by the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution.

Whereas, the Right of the People to Keep and Bear Arms is guaranteed as an Individual Right under the 2nd Amendment of the United States Constitution and under the Constitution of the state of Illinois, and;

Whereas, The Right of the People to Keep and Bear Arms for the defense of Life, Liberty, and Property, as stated by the 2nd Amendment, is regarded and an Inalienable Right, by the People of Woodford County, Illinois, as and;

Whereas, The People of Woodford County, Illinois, derive economic benefit from all safe and legal forms of firearms related recreation, hunting, shooting sports, and commerce conducted within Woodford County using all types of firearms, including Modern Sporting Firearms using standard capacity magazines, Handguns or Pistols, Long Rifles, and Shotguns which are allowable under the United States Constitution and;

Whereas, HB1465 is a Violation of the 4th Amendment of the United States Constitution requiring legal, responsible persons under the age of 21 to surrender lawfully owned firearms or face becoming instant felons; fails to define how to relinquish firearms; only allows possession at the Sparta Shooting Complex, but fails to provide similar exemptions for recreational shooting at gun clubs, private ranges,

or under the supervision of a legal, responsible adult or legal guarding, unless certified as a firearms instructor;

Whereas, HB 1467 is a violation of the 4th Amendment of the United States Constitution requiring persons to immediately relinquish lawfully owned bump stocks, trigger cranks, and similar devices, while also failing to provide where and how to relinquish such devices, thus creating instant felons upon passage;

Whereas, HB 1468 contains broad and unclear definitions which will cause confusion amongst firearm owners and Federally Licensed Dealers as to which type of firearms are subject to 72 hour waiting periods; bans non residents ~~from~~ from purchasing certain long guns defined loosely as "assault weapons", puts Federally Licensed Gun dealers in jeopardy of unknowingly violating the law; (amended at 6/19/2018 County Board meeting)

Whereas, HB1469 is a violation of the 4th Amendment of the United States Constitution requiring persons to immediately relinquish lawfully owned standard capacity magazines, fails to provide how to properly relinquish banned standard capacity magazines, creates instant felons if enacted as written, creates conflicts allowing for sale to out of state persons while stating possession is a felony, bans body armor worn for those who employ the use of chain saws, motorcyclists, range officers, firearms instructors, business owners and employees who work in dangerous neighborhoods or during night shifts;

Whereas, SB1657 and trailer bills will create economic hardship on lawfully owned and operated, small business firearm dealerships, in effect forcing them to close, while exempting large "big box" retailers who meet the 20% or less requirement pertaining to firearm sales; will create undue burdens and price increases on persons to lawfully purchase firearms; will have a direct negative impact on local economies through job loss and sales tax loss; will create ~~addition~~ additional layers of burdensome, Non Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms sanctioned, government regulation on top of the heavy Federal regulation currently in place; and imposes new fees on top of existing Federal Firearms License fees; (amended at 6/19/2018 Co Board meetin

Whereas, the Woodford County Board, being elected to represent the People of Woodford County, and being duly sworn by their Oath of Office to uphold the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Illinois, and;

Whereas, the Illinois House of Representatives and the Illinois Senate, being elected by the People of the State of Illinois and being duly sworn by their Oath of Office to uphold the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Illinois, and;

Whereas, the Governor of Illinois, being elected to represent the People of the State of Illinois and being duly sworn by the Oath of Office to uphold the United States Constitution and the Constitution of the State of Illinois, and;

Whereas, proposed legislation, any bills similar to, under consideration by the Illinois State Legislature would infringe the Right to keep and Bear Arms and would ban the possession, use, sale, or transfer of any modern sporting firearms, standard capacity magazines, body armor now employed by individual citizens of Woodford County, Illinois, for defense of Life, Liberty, and Property and would ban the possession, use, sale, or transfer of any modern sporting firearms or standard capacity magazines now employed for safe forms of firearms recreation, hunting, and shooting sports conducted within Woodford County, Illinois;

Whereas, the proposed legislation potentially violates the 5th Amendment failing to provide just compensation under the takings clause, 8th Amendment imposition against excessive fines and punishments on law abiding citizens by punitive forfeiture/relinquishment of lawfully owned property, and Ex Post Facto Law Clause of the United States Constitution.


Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that the People of Woodford County, Illinois, do hereby oppose the enactment of any legislation that would infringe upon the Right of the People to keep and bear arms and consider such laws to be unconstitutional and beyond lawful Legislative Authority.

Be It Further Resolved, that the Woodford County Board demands that the Illinois General Assembly cease further actions restricting the Right of the People to keep and bear arms, and hereby demand that the Governor of Illinois veto all such legislation which restricts the Right of the People to keep and bear arms.


Be It Further Resolved, that the Clerk of Woodford County is hereby directed to prepare and deliver certified copies of this Resolution to all members of the Illinois General Assembly and to the Office of the Governor.

Be It Further Resolved, that if the Government of the State of Illinois shall infringe upon the inalienable rights granted by the 2nd Amendment, Woodford County shall become a "Sanctuary County" for all firearms including Modern Sporting Firearms using standard capacity magazines, Handguns or Pistols, Long Rifles, and Shotguns unconstitutionally prohibited by the Government of the State of Illinois, in that, Woodford County will prohibit its employees from enforcing the unconstitutional action of the state government. from (amended at 6/19/2018 County Board meeting)
