Funded by the Illinois Department of Public Health, Woodford County Health Department offers programming through the Illinois Tobacco-Free Communities (ITFC) regional grant. The grant supports efforts in Woodford County to establish tobacco and e-cigarette (vaping) prevention and control programs to prevent tobacco and e-cigarette (vaping) use, eliminate exposure to second-hand smoke, and eliminate tobacco-related health disparities.

2024 was the sixth year of Illinois Tobacco-Free Communities regional grant funding, allowing Woodford County Health Department to collaborate with Peoria City/County Health Department, Tazewell County Health Department, and Hult Center for Healthy Living, a department of Carle Health, along with participating in the Partnership for a Healthy Community (healthyhqi.org). The regional grant continues to increase funding for each individual agency as well as the tri-county region, along with collaboration on policy initiatives and activities to promote a tobacco-free lifestyle. Some of the tri-county ITFC grant activities included promoting tobacco-free and/or smoke-free policies for multi-unit housing, outdoor spaces (parks, athletic fields, and outdoor events) and campuses (colleges, trade schools, businesses, and health care facilities), along with promoting the Illinois Tobacco Quitline (ITQL).

SMOKE-FREE ILLINOIS ACT

Woodford County Health Department educates business establishments on compliance with the Smoke-Free Illinois Act. As of January 1, 2024, the Smoke-Free Illinois Act (SFIA) now prohibits the use of e-cigarettes, vapes, and other electronic smoking devices in public places, places of employment, and within 15 feet of any entrance, exit, open window, or ventilation intake. The Smoke-Free Illinois Act is enforced through a partnership with local law enforcement. Local law enforcement agencies, along with health department staff, conduct compliance checks at food establishments and non-food establishments, and follow-up with enforcement on any complaints received or violations observed. There were 40 compliance checks conducted at county establishments in FY2024.



ILLINOIS TOBACCO QUITLINE

Woodford County Health Department promotes the Illinois Tobacco Quitline. Through the Illinois Tobacco Quitline, Woodford County residents can receive free assistance and the necessary tools to successfully quit tobacco products. The Illinois Tobacco Quitline can also help individuals quit e-cigarettes or vaping. Specialized counselors give personalized assistance while residents are in the process of quitting. Qualified individuals may also have access to nicotine replacement products through the mail. Residents can call 1-866-Quit-Yes or visit quityes.org.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE

The Health Department is provided Federal funding from two grants: Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) grant and Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) grant. These grants guide the Health Department's emergency preparedness activities and ensure the Health Department is ready to respond to a variety of threats that could adversely affect Woodford County. These threats include infectious diseases, natural disasters, biological, chemical, and radiological events. This funding allows the Health Department to create and review emergency plans, establish partnerships and memorandums of understanding (MOUs) with local groups, develop discussion-based, functional, and full-scale exercises, plan and drill medical countermeasures dispensing procedures and oversee the Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) volunteers.

The Health Department partners with many local emergency response groups and agencies in Central Illinois. Working with partners is a key component of a successful emergency preparedness and response program. The Central Illinois Coalitions in Response Planning (CIL-CARP) is a group of emergency responders, hospitals, public health, healthcare providers and emergency managers whose mission is to improve all hazards response through effective communications, planning and exercises. This group meets several times a year for networking and topical speakers. Additionally, the Emergency Response Coordinator (ERC) is a member of the Tri-County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) which brings together state and local officials, law enforcement, hospital, emergency management, fire, media, public health and other response agencies and groups from Peoria, Tazewell and Woodford counties. The ERC participates in monthly meetings with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, Medical Reserve Corps of Illinois, Region 5 MRC, Statewide Terrorism and Intelligence Center, and the Illinois Department of Public Health. The ERC virtually attended the NACCHO Preparedness Summit in March 2024 and attended OSF TEDCON in East Peoria in Aug 2024.

On May 9, 2024, WCHD employees held a tabletop exercise to test their knowledge of emergency plans, incident command positions and point of dispensing procedures during a fictitious aerosolized anthrax event. Staff used lessons learned from real life responses and training to guide discussion of their roles and responsibilities and to identify additional preparedness needs.

Staying up to date on training and procedures is an important part of emergency response. The ERC took Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP) training in October 2024 to improve skills necessary for planning, developing, and evaluation emergency drills and exercises. Additionally in July 2024, the ERC completed the Medical Countermeasures Point of Dispensing (POD), Planning and Response course in Springfield. This course is part of a certificate program and will assist the ERC in conducting drills and running dispensing sites.

The Woodford County Medical Reserve Corps is a group of medical and non-medical volunteers whose mission is to strengthen and support public health emergency response efforts. The MRC meets monthly to network, train and discuss public health emergency preparedness. In March 2024, MRC members took CPR training in El Paso to sharpen and improve their medical emergency skills. In May 2024, MRC members participated in an evacuation drill at Carle Eureka Hospital. MRC members played the part of patients and were evacuated out of the hospital during a bomb threat scenario. In September 2024, MRC members went through Stop the Bleed training. This was a hands-on training where members learned how to assist in a bleeding emergency before professional help can arrive.

IMMUNIZATIONS

LOW-COST LAB DRAW PROGRAM

CD AND OUTBREAK REPORTING

WCHD Clinical Services encompasses several programs such as communicable disease investigation and reporting, immunizations, lead and TB programs, and WIC (Women, Infants and Children).

Immunizations

WCHD offers a wide variety of immunizations for both children and adults. Many private insurances are accepted, as well as Medicare, Medicaid and other community health plans. Self-pay options are available.

Low-cost Lab Draw Program

A low-cost lab draw program is available through WCHD. Health care providers can send over lab orders for their patients to receive routine lab services at the Health Department. Results are sent back to the ordering provider with a few days of labs being drawn.

Communicable Disease and Outbreak Reporting

WCHD staff watch for trends or outbreaks of communicable disease, and provide guidance and education related to other illnesses. Communicable diseases are investigated and staff report disease cases to the state. Education is provided on the specific diagnosis, prevention, and infection control measures. Investigation includes a review of treatment, disease processes, and referrals to seek appropriate medical attention. WCHD works with local, state, and national providers to track and report numerous communicable diseases and to ensure proper care and follow up of those diagnosed. Annual surveillance reports are completed for influenza and other life-threatening illnesses.

CLINICAL SERVICES

WIC WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN

WIC is a federally funded supplemental food program designed to provide nutrition information and free food to support mothers, infants, and children in obtaining essential nutrients for healthy growth and development. In 2023, both remote and in-person services remained available. The remote options offered clients the advantage of minimizing exposure to illness, while WIC certifications and appointments could be scheduled during non-traditional hours, accommodating their needs and reducing reliance on limited transportation.

Woodford WIC also took part in the Farmers' Market Nutrition Program, which provided participants with \$30 in vouchers to use at local farmers' markets throughout the market season. This initiative allowed participants to purchase fresh, in-season fruits and vegetables. Additionally, education on selecting, preparing, and storing produce was provided to enhance their experience.

In October 2024, a Tri-County WIC training session was held in Tremont, involving staff from Peoria, Tazewell, and Woodford WIC. The training covered topics such as breastfeeding, program updates, and strategies for collaborating with individuals who have diverse working styles.

CLINICAL SERVICES

LEAD PROGRAM

The Woodford County Health Department is actively involved in the lead prevention program, screening and testing all high-risk patients as well as any community members who request testing. Lead testing is a prerequisite for many school and daycare applications. The nursing staff offers comprehensive case management, which includes various interactions with community members, families, and physician offices, ensuring follow-up testing, home visits, interventions, evidence-based resources, and educational discussions.

In Woodford County, the primary sources of elevated lead levels appear to be paint in older homes and contaminated soil. To minimize exposure, we recommend avoiding high lead concentration areas, not wearing shoes indoors, using wet sanding for renovations in homes built before 1978, opting for wet washing instead of dry mopping, and adhering to dietary guidelines to reduce the risk of lead absorption. In 2024, new elevated lead level cases have reached as high as 15.5 µg/dl.

The nursing staff is trained to conduct home visits and assess areas with high lead levels to assist state officials. Reports of elevated lead levels have come from numerous pediatric offices and tri-county health providers, as well as the IDPH lab. Families received education via phone calls, and educational materials along with developmental screenings were mailed to the homes of all new cases. While families/guardians are encouraged to allow nurses to conduct home visits, they have the option to decline; however, state environmental staff are mandated to perform a home visit.

Although the CDC has revised its reference value from ≥ 5 mcg/dL to 3.5 mcg/dL, Illinois has yet to adopt this change, but it is scheduled to take effect on January 1, 2025. This adjustment is likely to increase the number of cases that the health department will need to manage, though the extent of any funding increase remains uncertain.

In September, Helen Wright, the Northern Regional Lead Nurse Consultant, conducted an audit and found no issues or required corrections during her visit.


FOOD PROTECTION PROGRAM

The Food Protection Program at the Woodford County Health Department is committed to enhancing food safety through education. Our team offers a range of educational opportunities, including free in-service programs, Certified Food Protection Manager Certification courses, consultations, and public awareness initiatives. We also provide tailored training and plan design consulting for new retail food establishments.

To ensure compliance to the IL Food Code and the Woodford County Retail Food Establishment Sanitation Ordinance, our team conducts regular inspections and monitors food service operations in retail food establishments. With approximately 193 licensed and operating retail food service establishments in the county, we ensure that all regulations are upheld. For further information, please see Appendix C.

LOCAL HEALTH PROTECTION GRANT

The Woodford County Health Department receives the Local Health Protection grant each year to complete public health core services including food, septic, water, and communicable disease that are required through the Illinois General Assembly Administrative Code.

SEPTIC AND WATER WELL PROGRAMS

The sewage disposal and water programs work together to protect the drinking water supplies for residents outside city water treatment areas and to prevent pollution by overseeing standards for proper on-site sewage disposal. Services include permitting and inspecting all newly constructed or renovated water wells, closed loop wells and sewage disposal systems; inspecting wells and sewage systems during real estate transactions; interpreting and reporting water sample results; overseeing safe drinking water systems for all noncommunity wells from which more than 25 persons are served; investigating and resolving complaints; providing educational materials and presentations upon request. PARTNERSHIP FOR A HEALTHY COMMUNITY



The Partnership for a Healthy Community (PFHC) is a collaborative initiative spanning Peoria, Tazewell, and Woodford Counties. The current cycle, running from 2023 to 2025, emphasizes three health priorities: Mental Health, Healthy Eating/Active Living (HEAL), and Obesity. Additionally, Cancer and Substance Use will maintain their roles as performance management action teams to uphold the valuable work accomplished in the previous cycle.

During this cycle, new interventions have been introduced for mental health and obesity to advance progress over the next three years. Significant developments have occurred within the HEAL action teams. Staff from the WCHD are actively involved in the Illinois Tobacco Free Communities (ITFC) and the WIC Farmer's Market grants as part of their collaborative efforts.

September was designated as Hunger Action Month. Leading up to this month, various awareness campaigns were conducted, including social media outreach, the illumination of the Murray Baker Bridge, the distribution of a community toolkit for partners, reading *Lulu and the Hunger Monster* to over 450 local children, and organizing the Hunger Action Walk. The walk, which took place at Pekin's Mineral Springs Park, attracted 75 participants and resulted in the collection and distribution of 1,175 pounds of food to three food banks serving all three counties. Furthermore, four proclamations were issued by the City of Peoria, Peoria County, Tazewell County, and Woodford County board meetings.

Throughout this cycle, numerous WCHD staff members have engaged in various facets of the PFHC initiative. A major undertaking this year was the Community Health Needs Assessment survey, designed to gather public input on community health requirements across the tri-county area. Despite having a small team, WCHD continues to represent Woodford County in many aspects of the PFHC initiative. For further information, please visit <https://healthyhoi.org/>.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

The Health Department team had the privilege of meeting Dr. Sameer Vohra, the Director of the Illinois Department of Public Health in February. During his visit, Dr. Vohra toured our facility and engaged in discussions with our staff regarding various Public Health issues.



In April 2024, a storm shelter was constructed on the premises of the Health Department. This 8'x10' reinforced concrete structure is designed to safely accommodate up to 16 individuals during a tornado emergency.

Various other improvements were made to Woodford County Annex 4 and the Health Department this year. A new telephone system replaced the outdated system at the Health Department in October. The parking lot was replaced and restriped in May. Construction on the Health Department Clinic began in late 2024 and will be completed in early 2025. This remodel will allow for a dedicated med room, lab-draw room and an additional clinic room to better serve patients.




